Action Plan for Teaching the WTP Program By: Tracey Williams

- 1. Read all of the units and the lessons in the WTP textbooks that adequately cover your hearing questions. I suggest that you complete this task before you start working with your kids.
 - Unit I Lessons 1-5 covers the middle school questions adequately
 - Unit 1 Lessons 1,2,5,7 covers the high school questions adequately
 - Thoroughly read the United States Constitution, published books, and scholarly articles pertaining to the hearing questions
 - Make certain you take notes on all of the info. you read and highlight info. in the WTP books
- 2. Once you begin working with your students introduce the WTP program to them, explaining that it is a government/civics based educational program that teaches the fundamental principles of the U.S. gov't. Then ask students what do they know about the governmental system? From there you can conduct a brainstorming session, recording and discussing student responses. This would be an excellent manner in which to begin coaching your students.
- 3. Assign h/w from the WTP textbook, i.e., lesson reading, lesson/unit review questions, critical thinking activities, key terms, read and interpret court cases, reading of published books, and scholarly articles.
 - Begin each practice sessions by going over the previously assigned h/w.

- Have students begin to work on their debating skills by having them support varying positions on a specific issue, examples can be used from the WTP textbook or current event issues.
- 4. Once you have completed teaching the primary lessons from the textbook you should have your students begin to write their opening statements.
 - I recommend that you are very "hands on" during this process.
 - However, do not write the opening statements for your students.
 - Provide your students with the support and guidance needed to produce an exceptional opening statement.
 - Once the statements are complete revise and edit them.
 - Make certain the statements are 4 minutes in length.
- 5. Presentation- this is a very important component of the hearing process. Make certain the following guidelines are adhered to, referred to by me as PEEES:
 - Students must have good <u>posture</u> when sitting before the judges
 - Students must have good eve_contact
 - Students must demonstrate excellent delivery <u>emphasizing</u> very important points when reading the opening statements
 - Students must demonstrate perfect <u>enunciation</u> of words when reading the opening statements
 - Finally, students should be pleasant when they go before the judges, they must <u>smile</u>

Important Points to Remember

• All of the research that you and your students will complete will provide them with great depth and

understanding of the U.S. governmental system, which will allow them to respond adequately to the judges inquiry, which will be six minutes in length

- Your students opening statements should be written in such a manner that takes away as many of the judges initial questions as possible
- Produce a bibliography of all of the books and scholarly articles that you and your students read for future reference
